









Camellia "Kramer's Supreme"??. Normally just pink but often has "sports". I almost lost this Camellia in the drought, but it is recovering now.

Gillian (Rondebosch) shows her Lachenalia viridifolia, which she says is brightening the dark days and are so beautiful.


She received a couple of bulbs from Jenny two years ago.






And another *Lachenalia*, this time from Nicola – *L bulbifera*


The name has changed, but the old name is more descriptive as the leaf bases form bulbils – the pot is full of little plants (above).





Cherry's two beauties – Protea "Pink Ice" and Protea "Susara"








Clivia gardenii, from Jenny (left) and Isabella (right), which flowers from April to June
