During this time modern human traits such as language, art and complex tool production emerged for the first time. The plants and animals of the Cape fuelled the diets of early humans and allowed them to flourish during periods when the rest of Africa was uninhabitable.

> Haemanthus albiflos has a wide, mainly coastal distribution stretching from the southern Cape through many parts of the Eastern Cape, right up to the northern parts of KwaZulu-Unlike most other Haemanthus species, which sun, H.albiflos almost always occurs in shady habitat in forest and bushveld vegetation

ANOTHER VELD AND FLORA PROJECT UPDATE

"Thanks to all those who have contributed their 'already-read' copies of Veld and Flora. Rupert Koopman and Simone Van Rooyen from Botsoc have been very supportive of, and interested in, this venture and are passing on some back copies from their stores, as well as posters about conservation.

I have been able to assemble one reference set (1994 – 2021 with is missing only 3 copies) which now resides at the Witzands Aquifer Nature Reserve as a master set and a second reference set (2004 - 2021 missing about 9 journals) used by their conservation officers; started a reference set for Nieuwoudtville (2006 - 2021 missing about 15 journals) and started a set for Atlantis library (2008 – 2021 missing 11 journals) and kept a CHS set (2010 – 2021) in case anyone needs access to a particular article.

The Atlantis Library connection is new and very exciting. The young librarians, Sindi and Gabriel, are very enthusiastic. They say school children often come in asking for help with school projects and they are not always able to help them. Now this "donation" will be very helpful.

Very recently I made contact with the Cape Nature conservation manager at Mamre. They too run workshops for community members and would be very pleased to receive a reference set as well.

Apparently copies of Birdlife Africa and other environmental journals have also been snapped up by conservation officers. Often there are several duplicate copies of journals which are still useful for workshop and redistribution purposes.

So the challenge is on. We must do all we can to raise awareness and excitement about conserving our indigenous flora and fauna. Please keep sending journals you are ready to part with. Let me know so we can arrange how to collect them or pass them on to Glenda at outings or meetings now that you are meeting face-to-face again."
